

WOADY YALOAK TALKS SERRATED TUSSOCK

'Act early and stay vigilant' were the key messages delivered at a serrated tussock farm walk and information session held by the Woady Yaloak Catchment Group in October 2015.

A walk into the Misery Moonlight hills near Illabarook illustrated how challenging the weed can be to control once it has gained a foothold.

The walk and talk was led by retired State Government officer Bill Whiteside, who showed the group how to accurately identify serrated tussock, and shared his wealth of knowledge on the numerous integrated control options available.

With the identification of serrated

tussock often quite tricky, Mr Whiteside explained the key identifying features such as the tightly rolled needle-like leaf, the hairless ligule and tufted form; which often makes serrated tussock appear similar to the native tussock (*Poa labillardieri*) from a distance.

While small infestations of serrated tussock have occurred in the Misery Moonlight area for over a decade, annual control activities by landowners are keeping the weed in check.

Many of the farmers in attendance were unacquainted with serrated tussock and the newly acquired knowledge

gave rise to two landowners discovering random serrated tussock plants on their properties; once identified the plants were removed prior to seeding.

Controlling serrated tussock before it becomes established saves thousands of dollars and many hours work down the track.

The day proved a great success and the VSTWP were pleased that they could support the Woady Yaloak Catchment Group via a Landcare Field Day Grant.

UPCOMING WYNDHAM WEED EXPO

Looking to learn more about the common, and not so common, weeds of southern Victoria? Wyndham City Council is again holding their popular Weed Expo in March 2016.

Weeds spread quickly in rural areas when they are not controlled. It is therefore important that all landowners actively prevent weeds from establishing and spreading across their own property and further afield.

The Weed Expo will provide opportunities for you to meet with experts in weed and waterway management and gain skills in how to identify and control weeds on your property.

Community groups and government agencies will be in attendance and will be promoting how they can assist you in the fight against weeds. There will also be weed samples to examine and information brochures to take home.

After the success of the Weed Expo last year, the VSTWP are again planning to attend a stall, with an emphasis on sharing tips on how to identify serrated tussock from other common look-a-likes.

The Weed Expo will coincide with the Little River Primary School Fete and will be held on:

GISBORNE TREATS TUSSOCK INFESTATIONS

The Victorian Serrated Tussock Working Party is over halfway through stage 1 of its Gisborne serrated tussock extension project. The project is being undertaken in an area to the south east of the Gisborne Township and complements recent extension projects in the Riddells Creek area.

Since its commencement in June 2015, the project has offered the 230 landowners in the target area the opportunity to attend a serrated tussock information session, receive identification guidance, have their property assessed and mapped for serrated tussock, and be provided personalised treatment advice.

To date, over 130 landowners have taken up the offer of one-on-one advice, improving their ability to identify and manage serrated tussock for the long-term. The outcomes from the project so far include the treatment of approximately 30 hectares of serrated tussock infested land across the target area, with more landowners expected to receive tailored free inspections over the next few months.

The most important aspect of the VSTWP extension projects is ensuring all landowners are given an opportunity to receive a free property assessment and learn to distinguish serrated tussock from the other grassy plants, and how to best manage the serrated tussock on their property.

VSTWP Extension Officer Ivan Carter said "I have found mostly scattered serrated tussock infestations in the areas of Gisborne and northern Sunbury. If left untreated these infestations have the potential to spread and will rapidly decrease biodiversity in native grasslands and seriously reduce the agricultural capacity of properties".



Mr Carter advised "Landowners are reminded that monitoring, early detection and treatment are crucial components of an effective ongoing weed management program."
